


Ohio Department of Job and Family Services

- Significant increase in each fiscal year (FY) for child welfare
 - From \$77M in FY2019 to \$186M each in FYs 2020 and 2021
- Child care
 - \$10M in 2020 for quality infrastructure
 - No increase in eligibility levels for publicly funded child care
- Preschool education study
 - OH Dept of Education is required to produce a report, in consultation with JFS, that
 - Reviews early child initiatives in Ohio, including preschool, Head Start, and other early learning opportunities, and
 - Provides information regarding how other states support early learning opportunities




Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF)

- Over 20 earmarks to TANF funds in the budget
- Overall, the TANF surplus is still budgeted to be exhausted by FY2023




Programs and services for older adults

- Increase for Long-Term Care Ombudsman
 - Each regional program will hire at least one full-time ombudsman and have full-time volunteer coordination
- \$1.2 Million increase for Senior Community Services
 - To be used for senior farmer's markets
- Increase for adult protective services
 - Brings states funding from \$31,000 per county to \$48,000 per county
- Increases program payment rates for PASSPORT and Assisted Living




Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services

- Fully fund a comprehensive continuum of care system for behavioral health services that includes prevention and treatment and addresses issues of parity:
 - Invests \$18 million in a new public awareness education campaign to help reduce the stigma associated with mental health and substance use disorders
 - Invests \$20 million to provide Ohio's schools with free, evidence-based prevention curricula and professional development for school personnel
 - Increases treatment capacity in Ohio through an investment of \$22 million to provide crisis support for families



Student Wellness and Success Fund

- Within the Ohio Department of Education, there is \$675 million over the biennium allocated for the Student Wellness and Success Fund
- These funds are allocated on a per-pupil basis factoring in the percentage of students who live at or below 185% of the federal poverty level
- Funds can be used on any of the following:
 - Mental health services,
 - Services for homeless youth,
 - Services for child welfare involved youth,
 - Community liaisons,
 - Physical health care services,
 - Mentoring programs,
 - Family engagement and support services,
 - City Connects programming,
 - Professional development regarding the provision of trauma informed care and
 - Professional development regarding cultural competence



Ohio Department of Medicaid: New Major Provisions

- Legislature aimed to control more of what happens between Medicaid, managed care and pharmacy benefit managers. Some of the proposals stayed in the final budget, but many were vetoed. Medicaid is also taking a close look at this issue
- Multi-system youth:
 - \$18 million over the biennium to help prevent voluntary custody relinquishment
- Medicaid coverage extended for postpartum women for one year post-delivery
- Medicaid Director is required to implement strategies that address social determinants of health including:
 - housing,
 - transportation,
 - food,
 - interpersonal safety,
 - toxic stress and
 - Employment
